## CENTRAL NORMAL FINANCE CAMPAIGN PROGRESSES

### Committee at Work

The members of the finance committee, recently appointed to plan a booster program for Central Normal College, report that people contacted by the workers have announced their willingness to cooperate in every way with the work.

During the past twelve months students have paid into the community, outside of tuition, \$92,000, \$10,000 of which went for room rent.

Because of a change in education laws and the present war situation, which has reduced the number of young men enrolled, the attendance the past year was the lowest in many years. This reduced attendance, resulting in reduced income, means that the college may not be able to make the necessary improvements to meet present education requirements. The purpose of the present drive is to so equip the school that it will be able to place the attendance at a much larger figure.

When the local drive is completed, the alumni will take up the work of accumulating an endowment fund.

### COMMERCE DEPARTMENT HAS VISITOR

Mr. L. A. Orr of the Ingleside High School, Ingleside, Illinois, visited Central Normal on Tuesday, June 24. He is General Manager of the National Personality Contest as well as the author of a typing textbook.

Mr. Orr's lecture on his personality chart in which he stressed the 13 points of the personality test that some employers use in rating applicants was of much interest to the commerce students who will soon be looking for jobs as well as to those who will be teaching.

After his lecture, Mr. Orr demonstrated typing techniques and several new philosophies in the teaching of typing.





The girls elected a new house president Wednesday. Olive Stuterville was elected to fill the vacancy made by Kathryn Baynes who left at the end of the spring term.


## ALUMNUS INJURED



He was a life long friend and classmate of R. S. Russ, a well-known Kansas Educator who also attended C. N. C. in 1881. Russ Hall, the Administration Building on the Kansas State Teachers College campus, constructed in 1909 was named for this former student of C. N. C.

The Kansas Conference consisted of lectures, discussion groups, clinical surveys, diagnostic procedures, and training periods. Practical, inexpensive materials as well as the use of instruments were demonstrated. Approximately one hundred elementary teachers, secondary remedial reading teachers, and school administrators were enrolled. The Indiana State Teachers College Conference was devoted to programs of elementary education and was attended by more than two hundred teachers.

The Psi Chi's are busy making plans for their summer dance which will be held Saturday night, July 12, at the Shelter House at the park.




## STUDENTS AND TEACHERS ATTEND I. U. CONFERENCE

### ALPHA MU KAPPA FIRST MEETING




