MARTIN GOES TO CARBONDALE

A letter was received from Bertha Marting as follows:

"Today I resigned this position at Plainfield to accept one in the high school at Carbondale, Illinois. This new position offers a substantial increase in salary (\$150 per month for 9 months) and is in the Senior High School. I will teach girls physical education and two classes of typing.

"I regretted to resign at Plainfield because the officials were so nice to me there, and I was especially nappy to know I was to teach so near Central Normal College and my many friends in that locality. However, I felt that Corbondale was the better offer of the two and that I was justified in accepting it.

"Carbondale is located about 125 miles west of Evansville, with a population of 9,000. There are two high schools there, the Community High School where I will teach and the University High School which is connected with the Southern Illinois State Teachers College.

Based on Last Year's Grades

Announcement has been made by President Hunt of the scholarships to be awarded for the year of 1940-41 to be applied to next year.

Each year three scholarships of \$75, \$50, and \$25 are given for the first three places of each class--freshmen, sophomores and juniors.

Viola Williamson won the first place among the juniors with an index of 2.915. Mary Steinman, William Ratliff and Joe Merk tied for second place with an index of 2.666. Therefore, the second and third place scholarships will be pooled and divided equally, giving \$25 each.

The sophomores who won were Opal Williamson, first with an index of 2.915. Evelyn Workman, second, with 2.43; and Carol Harrison, third with 2.38.




