Each tries to sell an idea, a service or a product. From the Garden of Eden came the first sales talk. Every step in the world's progress has been the result of someone's selling an idea.

THE HISTORY OF FOOTBALL

This present game of football can be traced as far back as the year 1300. At that the game was prevalent "football", that is the hands were not used, for the rule was that the ball was to be propelled by the "feet". There were class rivalries, and occasional games with nearby colleges, but generally there was not much doing until about the year 1874.

The first Inter-Collegiate football game was not played until 1874 between a team from Montreal, Canada and Harvard University. This game ended in a tie.

In the year 1873 the Football Association of Princeton College was formed. At this first meeting uniform and standard rules were set up.

By the year 1878 football began to attract great crowds. The Princeton-Yale contest was witnessed by 4,000 persons and the cost of the field was \$300. There were eleven men on the Yale team, six line men, behind them were two half backs, and behind them were the remaining three backs. A goal was equal to four touchdowns but in case of a tie a goal kicked from a touchdown took precedence over four touchdowns. At the captains were the sole arbiters of dispute and each team chose their captain from his ability to argue.

The feature of kicking reached a perfection that has never been surpassed. The ball was kicked at every opportunity by the backs and forwards both. Every player could punt, drop, and place kick with facility. Many backs were proficient kickers with either foot.

At about this time passing came into the game. The ball traversed the field from side to side with the speed and accuracy of a baseball.

Later the man who snapped the ball became known as the snapper-back. He later took up his position in the line and became known as the centre-rush.

It wasn't until the year 1881 that the professional trainer came into existence.

In about the year of 1882 the positions of the players were changed to, seven forwards, a quarterback, two half-backs, and a full-back. The scoring was changed to the following:

- Safety.....1.
- Touchdown.....2
- Goal after Touchdown.....4
- Goal from field.....5

It was also settled that there should be two judges.

In the year of 1893 Harvard has some new tricks to pull. One player played half-back with his entire body covered with grease thus forcing a rule into the book against such "sticky or greasy substance".

In the year of 1895 a game between Harvard and Yale resulted in a butchery. Of the twenty-two players seven were so injured that they were carried from the field in a dying condition. So much talk was made about this game that the ruling was finally changed.

The game of football has come up through the years as thus until we have our present day rules and regulations.
