ARTHUR L. FOLEY, EMERITUS PROFESSOR OF INDIANA UNIVERSITY, WRITES

Dear Friend:

I want to thank you, Dean Hightower, and the members of your faculty for the Doctor of Laws Diploma which you recently sent me. In the past I have received four other degrees, but no diploma unless I ordered one and paid for it. And even then, not one of them was anything like as elegant as the one you sent, and which I was not expecting. I certainly thank you for your kindness, courtesy, and consideration. Not many schools have such officials.

I think that a student's life and ideals are often more influenced by his early teachers than either the student or teachers realize. I am glad that I spent my most impressionable years at the Central Normal College, and in a small town rather than a large city.

ANOTHER ALUMNUS

Dear Mr. Hunt:

In 1894, and '95 I attended the Central Normal College. When I left the College about Oct. 30, 1895 I came to Texas, and located in Matagorda County, where I have remained all these years. At the time I left the college I knew all the faculty. The president of the college at that time was J. A. Joseph.

I remember Dr. Rigdon, Mr. Johnson and many others whom have slipped my memory, I entered the college from Ala. The time spent in college was the happiest and most beneficial period of my whole life. I have not kept up with any of my school mates but I remember a great many of them. I remember that Elmer and Oscar Thomas of Greencastle, Ind. who roomed at the same little house about a block from the old framed dormitory. I have had some correspondence with Elmer since he has been a United States Senator from Okla. I remember when I entered the college that there was still existing some feeling between the Northern people and Southern people and I was not there long before a student at the dormitory asked me if my father was in the war, of course I knew he wanted to know the side he was on. My answer to Mr. Craig was, "My father got shot in the back of the head making a charge." That answer of course indicated that my father was running when he got shot in the back of the head and this answer was passed from table to table in the dormitory and created a lot of laughter. My answer to Mr. Craig made it easy for me to get acquainted with all the students who were stopping at the dormitory. I have been in Indiana a great many times since I located in Texas but never had an opportunity to go back to Danville until Oct. 26, 1941 when I had some business up at Crawfordsville. I drove down to Danville to view the old college buildings and see just what changes had been made in the town. The new buildings that had been built since I was there made it hard at first to recognize the two old college buildings but I finally recognized the buildings and the place where I roomed.

Oct. 26th being on Sun. I did not have the opportunity of meeting any of the faculty which would have been a pleasure to me. No doubt there will be some of the faculty of 1895 that is still connected with the college.

I have been reasonably successful since coming to Texas all of which I must give "The" Central Normal College credit.

There are approximately 25,000 soldiers here in camp besides the officers and the non-commissioned officers.

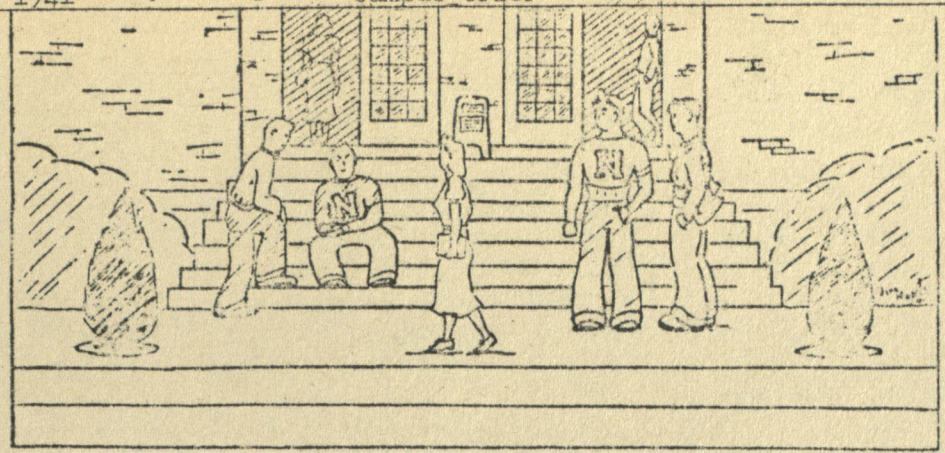
Saturday we received a message from the War Department saying that selectees will have no Xmas


