### ART CLUB BRINGS EXHIBIT TO CAMPUS

The Art Department is to announce the opening of an exhibition of imported Japanese wood block prints. The exhibit opened December 8 and will continue through December 17 from 2 to 5 each afternoon.

The exhibit was obtained from the Robert-Lee Gallery of New York City and includes many first edition prints by such masters as Hokusai, Hiroshige and Kiyonaga. In addition to the first editions there are others that have been made by the identical wood-cut process as the originals made so many years ago. New blocks have been especially cut by hand for these prints and printed on the finest mulberry paper obtainable. A special trip to the Orient was made to arrange for the issuance of these prints and to supervise the accuracy of the workmanship and their fidelity to the originals.

The subjects included in the exhibition are: animals, flowers, landscape, and figures, of both the color and the black and white types.

All faculty members, students, and townspeople are cordially invited to attend this exhibition.

Would it mean involving ourselves further by going to war with Germany and other countries.

Would it mean standing by and seeing our homes and cities being blown to bits by bombs and not doing anything about it?

Whatever the solution, it is our duty, as citizens, and as students of Central Normal College, to further our education so as to better do our part. A new term is rapidly approaching. Are you going to drop out, or are you going to enroll again, so that you, too, can help America in the best way possible?

We need to think seriously how we can best develop to serve the greatest purpose.

Do we not find, in looking back on past experience, that our kind and generous interpretations of the world in general were truer than our harsh ones?
