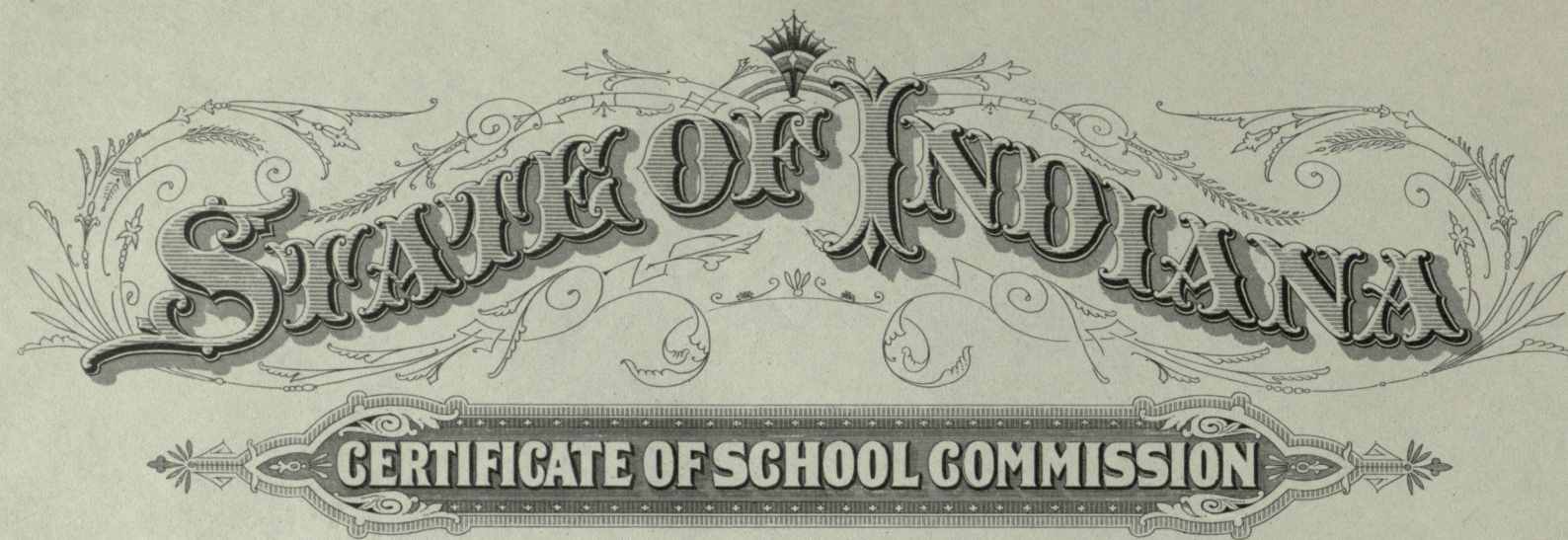

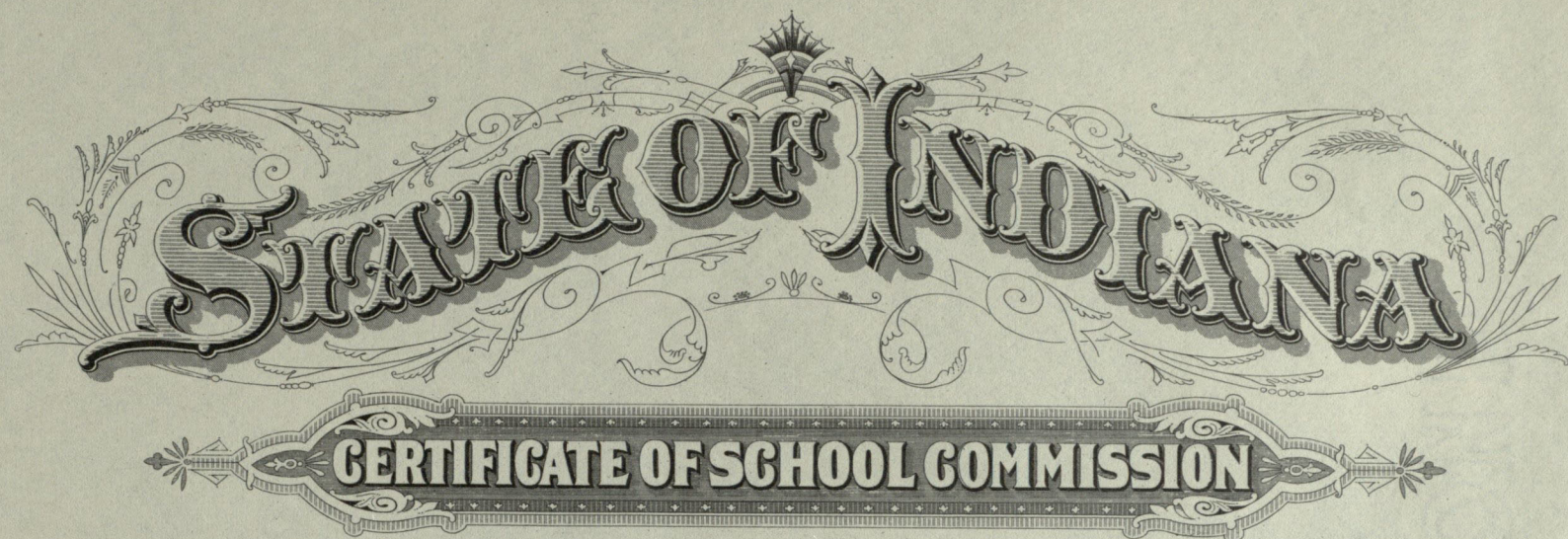

## JANITORS CONTRACT

This agreement between-----School Trustee of -----School Township, in Hendricks County, and State of Indiana, party of the first part, and -----of the same School Township, in said County and State of the second part, hereby certifies that the said second party agrees to take employment as janitor of the school building in School district No. \_\_\_\_\_ of said School Township for the School term beginning on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_ 192\_\_\_\_, and to do all services required as such janitor during said school term, at and for the agreed sum of \$ \_\_\_\_\_ per month.

That said second party shall do and perform all his duties under the direction of the trustee and principal of said school, and shall do and perform all his said services as such janitor within and be governed by the following rules and conditions as apart and parcel of his contract, to-wit;

1st. Second party will abstain from the use of rough language tobacco, and all form of gambling, while in or around the school premises.

2nd. Second party will thoroughly cleanse the building and grounds; that is, all desks, woodwork, windows and blackboards washed, floors oiled, building and closets disinfected, and yard cleansed of all rubbish before the opening of school.

3rd. Second party shall make any necessary changes in the seating arrangements of the rooms, see that all desks, windows and the like are kept in order and make minor repairs and clean as necessary about the building and grounds after school as directed by the principal.

4th. Have the entire building comfortably heated by eight o'clock A.M. each school day, and maintain a proper temperature throughout the day.

5th. Clear all walks and entrances of snow before 8 A.M. each day.

6th. Ring all bells as directed by the principal.

7th. Sweep and dust all parts of the building, also empty all waste baskets.

8th. Cleanse the blackboards and dust the erasers once each day.

9th. Keep all blinds and shades in good working order throughout the school term.

10th. Oil all floors, cleanse all windows and glass in doors as often as the principal may direct.

11th. Keep school grounds cleared of all trash and rubbish as directed by the principal.

12th. Cooperate with the principal in securing discipline in the building or on the grounds, and report to the principal all delinquencies that he may observe.

13th. Shall open and close the building, haveing it properly heated for school activities outside of school hours.

14th. Second party shall be under the sole direction of the principal and perform any other additional duties suggested by the principal.

15th. First party shall furnish the second party with ample equipment and supplies for carrying out the above contract and agreement, such as brooms, brushes, dust-cloths, oil, sweeping compound, disinfectants, eraser cleaner and sundry fepair materials tools shovels, etc.

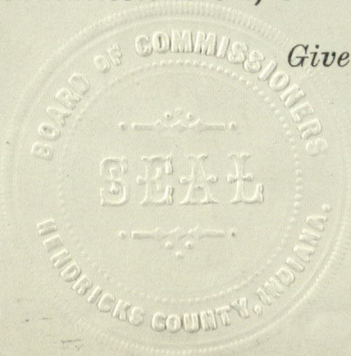

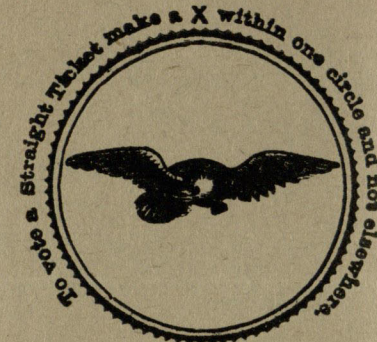

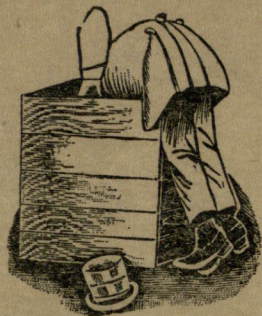

## EDUCATION BOARDS HOLD JOINT MEETING

All the old board was present and all but one of the incoming board. Everybody made talks expressing satisfaction over the splendid co-operation on the old board and looking forward to the work of the new board.

The County Superintendent C. O. Caplinger delivered the following talk to the boards:

### ONE AND ONE-HALF YEAR'S PROGRESS.

At this time, when the present Boone County Board of Education has assembled for its last regular meeting, it seems fitting and wise that we should review a little of its past history and see what has been done.

In the past year and a half, during which time it has been my happy privilege to be intimately associated with this Board and to know its aspirations and its problems, it has done a wonderful work. Boone County schools have apparently become the center of attraction for the school people of the state who are engaged in the education of rural boys and girls. And while the eyes of the state have been upon the schools of Boone County the Board of Education has acquitted itself nobly. I challenge any other Board in the state to show as much constructive action taken in so short a time. Other Boards have done as much but not in the short length of time.

When the schools first opened a year ago this fall the proposition of enrollment in the American Junior Red Cross came before the Board. You gave your consent and cooperation in this good work and Boone County gained not only state wide but also national recognition for enrolling every school and every school child in that organization. This was an important step in

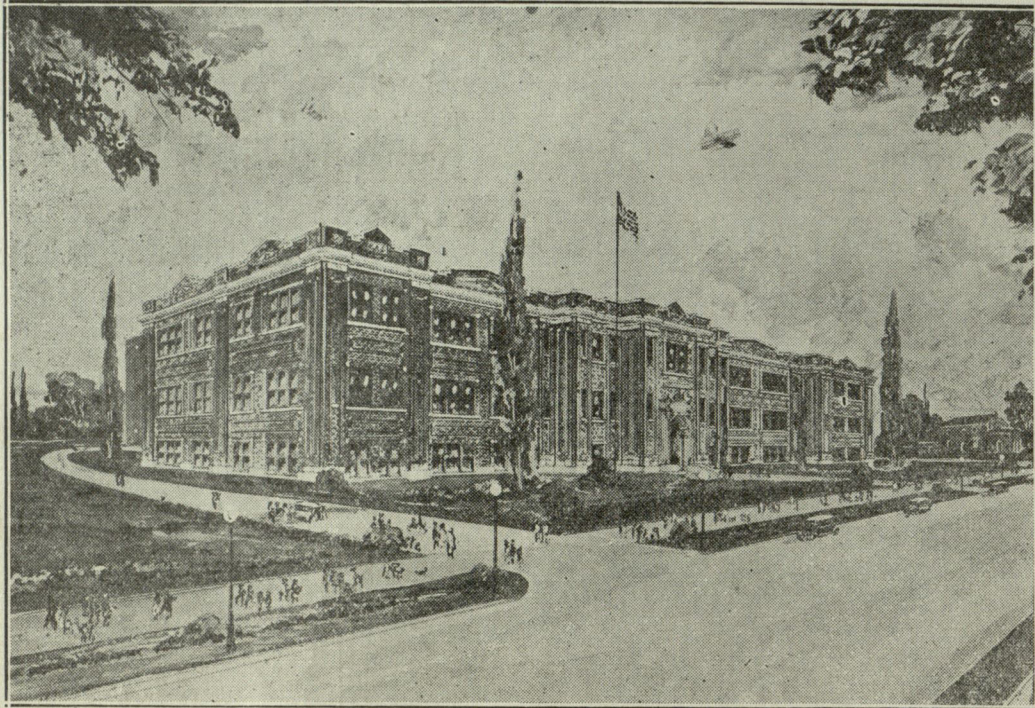

Dear Friends:

It was with general pleasure that we received a dainty album made by you, as it increases still more the cordiality between the children of the two Americas. The Junior Red Cross, which has neither country nor creed, is the sacred symbol which ought to appear on all the altars of all the countries and ought to be respected and known by all the children of the world. leagues of the Junior Red Cross, because it is ours, and was created for us. 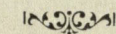

### Merry Christmas.

The editor of the "Boone County School News" takes this opportunity to wish all of the readers a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.

### Our New State Superintendent.

The "Indiana Teacher" in its "Editorial Comment" of November makes a splendid statement in regard to the qualifications of our new State Superintendent, Mr. Charles F. Miller. The comment says in part, "Mr. Miller is eminently fitted by preparation, experience and ability for this high office. He has spent his professional life in the public schools of Indiana. He knows the problems of both the teacher and the administrator."

The Comment makes another significant statement when it says, "Mr. Miller stands for equality of educational opportunity."

Most school men will recall that the title of a famous address given by our present state superintendent was "Equality of Educational Opportunity." The state awaits with interest to see what Mr. Miller thinks about and means by "Equality of Educational Opportunity."

### Alvin Cecil Kibbey.

In the death of Alvin C. Kibbey, Superintendent of Shelbyville city schools, Boone County has lost another illustrious son and the school system of Indiana a school man, whose place cannot be filled readily. In fact, many people regarded him as one of the six most outstanding school men of the state.

Our county is justly proud of such splendid sons as Senator Samuel M. Ralston and Superintendent Alvin C. Kibbey. Their lives have been lived on a high plane of social service and Christian endeavor.

There were two outstanding headlines in the life of Mr. Kibbey. First, he had the Christian philosophy of life; and second, he was a ceaseless worker.

At the service held in Old Union church, Mr. Deitzer paid a great tribute to the life and work of Mr. Kibbey. He said in part:

"As a member of the Board of Education I knew Mr. Kibbey intimately. I feel my inability to properly convey the noble principles for which he stood. These principles were not only a part of his belief, but greater still a part of his practice. He was always fair, always truthful, always honest, sincere, stern but not severe, determined and persevering, advising, not criticising, shunning the show and the spectacular, ever reminding me of that Scripture, 'He

that exalteth himself shall be abashed, but he that humbleth himself shall be exalted.' He actually personified 'service before self.' An organizer and educator of the highest type, inspirer, counselor, friend and guide to teacher and pupil, educated and uneducated, rich and poor, black and white alike."

### Our Children.

The most important business of any generation of people is to make better the conditions and opportunities for the next generation. Great people have been called great statesmen, and good people have been called blessed because they recognized the fundamental truth that it is man's appointed duty to make brighter the path up which the next generation must go.

How great the contrast between this splendid ideal and that which is prompted by selfishness and ignorance—the short sighted idea so often expressed in the statement, "Our children have as good as I ever had." For years China was held in darkness by the idea that conditions must be kept the same as they were during the time of their fathers.

We must make progress. Of course it costs. We must sacrifice. Our forefathers fought and died for us on the fields of battle. The forests of Indiana were cleared under the most rigid conditions of suffering and privation. They sacrificed for us. At the present we have no battles of that kind to fight. We have no forests to clear. Is there nothing we can do to aid the younger generation? Yes, but it also means sacrifice just as our forefathers sacrificed. Our children need new school buildings; they need better equipment and these things cost money.

Our opportunities to aid the next generation are as great as those of our forefathers. Can we measure up?

### What Patrons Can Do.

**Correct Reading.**  
Patrons have certain rights which they have been all too slow to use. One of them is to see to it that their boys and girls have good books in the libraries of their schools. There is one set of books put out each year by the Young People's Reading Circle Board of Indiana which should be in each school in the county. It is a carefully selected and graded list of books. The cost is around \$20.00 for the set of more than twenty books. Each year a new set is selected and no school should miss getting each set each year. Money is spent for a great many things of less value to the township.

Patrons can check up on this by asking their teacher if her school

has been provided with the Young People's Reading Circle books this year, and if they are not in the library, request the trustee to get them. That is a perfectly just right of the patron.

Most all consolidated schools will have them, but the boys and girls of the one and two-room schools will not have them in most cases. It is a pity that the patrons of the one and two-room schools do not awake to these discriminations against their children.

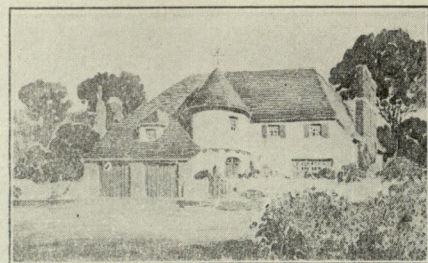

### Music Memory Corner.

Since all the schools in Boone County have entered the Indiana State Music Memory Contest, it is necessary to have suitable material concerning the life of the composer, his inspiration, and orchestration. In each issue of this paper will appear a story of some selection which we will study. The following story is for Nos. 2-14 and 21 of our Music Memory list.

**PETER ILJITCH  
TSCHAIKOWSKY.**

In Russia it has been a custom to bomb those unhappy Potemkins whom the people do not love. Peter Iljitch (il-yitsh) Tschaiowsky (Chi-koff-skee) employed subtler methods. He concealed his ammunition in his music. It's melancholy beauty, its gorgeous colors, its volcanic passion, shocked the conservative and fascinated the public. His temperament was typical of his country and his times. The unrest, the fatalism, the vague longing for a brighter and freer day which possessed Russia, were echoed in his art. He was born May 7th, 1840. One day while he was having a geography lesson with his brothers and sisters he shocked his governess by kissing the map of Russia and spitting on the rest of the world. Only one other country was excepted, a country always dear to Tschaiowsky's heart. When reproved for his action he answered, "But didn't you see? All the time I kept my hand over France."

Tschaiowsky's first musical impulse came when his father brought home a mechanical player, an orchestrian which played airs by Mozart and Italian composers, Bellini, Donizetti and Rossini, whom he came to know and love. His own style as a composer was greatly influenced by these men.

Peter loved his mother dearly and when she died of cholera in 1854, he retired unto himself, becoming morose, cynical and somewhat self-centered. It was some time before he recovered. He fitted himself, like other men of his rank, for an official sinecure in Petrograd, where the pay was good and work light. By day he was unsatisfactory and absent-minded but at night he was the darling of the drawing rooms of Petrograd, for he was a good looking young man who had a charming talent for improvising waltzes at the piano. This was Tschaiowsky in his 20th year.

Then came a period of disgust. He did not like his idle life, so gave up his good position and salary and went to the conservatory to study with Nicholas Rubenstein, who was very fond of him and

helped him thru his poverty stricken days by giving him shelter, very often giving him clothes and securing pupils for him. Thru Rubenstein's interest Tschaiowsky became professor of harmony at the newly opened conservatory in Moscow.

Tschaiowsky's fame began to spread but he was still not making much money. So he decided to give a concert and for the occasion he composed a new work, "Andante Cantabile," for string quartet. He heard a plaster singing beneath his window, a sad, mournful song loved by all Russian Peasants and used it as the substance of "Andante Cantabile," which is No. 21 on the Music Memory List for Grammar Grades and High School.

He was very shy, and sensitive and as the hour of performance drew near he began to wonder if he had created a work of art or made a fool of himself. His doubts were relieved in a way he never forgot. Count Leo Tolstoi, the great Russian author of "The Resurrection" and "Anna Karenina," sat by him while the slow movement was being played and because he was so profoundly moved he wept. "I have heard the soul of my patient and suffering people," he said.

And now came into his life love, which either builds or destroys. An Italian Opera Company visited Moscow whose leading lady was Desiree Artot, a woman of thirty years, not good looking, but with a very expressive face. Tschaiowsky fell deeply in love, they became engaged, but she would not give up the stage. Very suddenly she married a Tenor in the Company and Peter was broken-hearted. However this bitter experience gave him the inspiration for the music for an overture for "Romeo and Juliet." Had it not been for his own tragedy he could not have written with so much feeling.

With the "Romeo and Juliet" Overture Tschaiowsky sprang into prominence not only in Russia but also thruout Europe. His circumstances began to mend and in return for what she had snatched away, Fate sent him one of the most beautiful friendships in the history of art. This was his singular relationship with Madame Von Meck, the widow of a rich engineer, who loved music and had been profoundly affected by Tschaiowsky's music. Altho he never spoke a word to her in his life, they corresponded daily and he confided to her as a companion soul. She asked him to allow her to pension him for the remainder of his days and it would make her infinitely happy to know him secure and able to compose as his in-

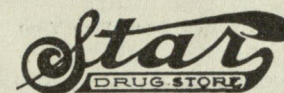

spiration directed. He accepted. In the meantime a woman whom he hardly knew wrote him telling him she loved him. Her expressions were so sincere and so touching that he asked her to be his wife, even tho he did not love her. He immediately wrote his friend, Madame Von Meck, about it. She neither criticized nor condemned. The marriage was an utter failure and when the marriage was dissolved, altho he never blamed her, Tschaikowsky was a broken man.

The Russian National Anthem served Tschaikowsky well as he used it in "Marche Slave" and "Overture 1812." This last selection (No. 14 on the Music Memory List) was written for the Consecration of the Cathedral of Christ in Moscow, which was built in memory of the burning of that city in 1812. The overture was to be performed by an enormous orchestra, in the great square before the church. At the climax church bells were to ring, and the place of the big drums was to be taken by Cannon. How successfully Tschaikowsky

imagined this scene—the assembled multitudes in many-colored costumes, the peasants and the Nobles, the priests and their icons, the soldiers, the guards of the Czar and the towering temple of worship for a background—and with what technical mastery he filled the great spaces of his canvas is shown by the music.

The music depicts the events during the Napoleon Campaign of 1812, when after a victory at Borodino, the French general bombarded Moscow and took the Kremlin or citadel of the city. The Russians during the night set fire to the town and at a given signal rose in arms and succeeded in causing Napoleon to retreat from the city.

This descriptive Overture opens with a peaceful scene in the city of Moscow. It is night and the city has retired to its rest after having sung the Russian hymn, "God Preserve Thy People." Suddenly the music changes and the French troops are heard approaching with snatches of the "Marsellaise" thru the booming of cannon and the uproar of the attack. This works up to a furious climax of sound, all the noise of the terrific battle being depicted in the pounding of drums and the blare of trumpets against the massed orchestra. As the Russians rise to defend their homes the battle grows fiercer and then the sky clears and the strains of "God Save Our Czar" are heard as the French retreat from the broken city.

Tschaikowsky composed operas, symphonies, and suites in rapid succession but he waited years before giving to the world one of his gayest and most delightful compositions, "The Casse-Noisette," ("Nut-cracker Suite"). The music was to accompany a Fairy Ballet. In the first scene happy children are gathered about a Christmas tree. Candles are lighted and everyone receives presents. To little Marie is given a common nut-cracker, but she likes this best of all. The boys snatch it from her and it is broken. Marie bursts into tears, talks to it, caresses it and before going to bed herself rocks it to sleep under the Christmas tree.

...It is midnight! Marie awakes, remembers her broken nut-cracker and steals down to the darkened room. Strange sight! Swarms of mice are coming in from all sides. Then a wonderful thing happens. The Christmas cakes, the toys and best of all, her beloved nut-cracker, come to life. There is great commotion. War is declared between the mice and the toys. The nut-cracker takes command and fights with the Mouse King. When the nut-cracker is almost vanquished Marie takes her shoe and throws it at the Mouse King. He dies and the mice are defeated. The nut-cracker changes to a handsome prince, thanks Marie and takes her with him to his magic kingdom.

The second scene of the ballet shows the Jam Mountain in the fairy-land of sweets and toys. Here the sugar-plum is the Queen. She and her retinue gladly welcome Marie and the nut-cracker. For the entertainment of the guests of the real world is held the dance of the sweets and the toys. The "Danse Chinoise" (Chinese Dance) is the dance of the tea one of the gayest

and most popular of these little pieces. The Danse des Mirlitons" (Toy Pipe Dance) is the droll dance of little red (red) musical toys that sound like a piece of paper over a comb.

The last work of Tschaikowsky's life was his "Symphonie Pathetique." At a banquet Tschaikowsky drank from a pitcher of unboiled water, contracted cholera and died on the morning of October 25, 1893.

This was the end of a noble and unfortunate man, the composer, who had done more than any other to make Russia known musically to the outside world. Latin, Slav-Anglo-Saxon, all have been stirred by his voice, by the human documents which he wrote with his heart's blood in the little black characters on music paper.

teaching our boys and girls some of the fundamental principles of citizenship. Furthermore it had its effect on the Senior Red Cross organization, until our county is among the first in that respect.

Second, the proposition of "Co-operative Buying" was discussed and arrangements were made to try it out. The supplies for the various townships were listed and advertised for bidders. The bids were opened and contracts let for the county. This proved that it is possible under the present system to buy as a county. As to what the saving was to the people of Boone County, we sight you to one contract which would have cost the taxpayers \$750.00 at retail as the separate townships would have had to buy, but which was bought for \$427.50 when the county pooled their order. That was a saving of \$322.50 or over 40 per cent. on the one contract. And the county bought, not a cheapened article, but the same article that would have cost \$750.00 at regular retail price.

Third, the question of transfers had given some people a great deal of worry, so the Board in true characteristic manner passed a resolution which granted the right for grade students to cross township lines without the township paying a transfer tuition, as long as it could be done without extra cost. This improved the attendance district and made conditions better for the patrons.

Fourth, your president came before you with the proposal to publish a patron's newspaper to be known as the "Boone County School News." Realizing the mission which such a paper could have among the rural patrons, the Board gladly gave consent and co-operation in its publication. Today the "Boone County News" reaches a thousand families and is established on its own feet so it will not cost Boone County taxpayers a single penny. This paper keeps the patrons in touch with school activities and advertises the schools throughout the state. Copies of this paper go from California to Florida, and as far north as Michigan.

Fifth, the question of a Music System which would give the boys and girls of Boone County a chance to study and know something about this important subject came before the Board. After thorough discussion and careful investigation the Hollis Dan Music System was adopted and a competent, talented county music supervisor selected. To show the sane spirit of the Board, the question of politics did not enter in her selection. The system has been so successful that the students and patrons are sold on the idea, and if the Board had done nothing more than adopt this music system it would have endeared itself to the hundreds of school patrons of the county.

Sixth, the Board did not feel that the old township institutes were fulfilling the mission which they had filled in the past, so it went on record as opposed to the present township institute law and asked for its repeal, teachers' meetings to

be substituted at the call of the Board. Not satisfied to wait for legislative action it was voted to bring all townships together in a joint township county institute each month. This permits a better grouping of the teachers, and is a step in the right direction.

What wonder that we feel a great sense of pride when we view this progressive work of the Board which has been done in such a short time. I have a feeling of gratitude in my heart because of this service you have rendered the boys and girls of Boone County—a gratitude which is greater than I can express. And in my imagination I can see those same boys and girls when they become men and women looking back to this Board of Education with grateful hearts and thanking God that you realized that children were more valuable than selfish interests; more precious than rubies and diamonds; than dollars and cents. I am glad my lot was cast with this group of men.

TO THE NEW BOARD OF  
EDUCATION.

To the new Board of Education, let me say that I congratulate you Gal 2—Dec Board of Edu Meets... upon your election as trustees. You are, no doubt for the most part, progressive. We need progressive men on all Boards of Education. You are Democrats and Republicans, but when dealing with the sacred schools of Boone County all thought of political affiliation must be forgotten. "The boys and girls" must be the uppermost thought and the best must be done for them even at the price of personal sacrifice.

Let me say that I have said to the retiring Board that the work is all done, let me hasten to assert that the work is not all done. You have a man's sized job awaiting each one of you. While the present Board has done wonderful work as a Board around this table, yet they have, in some cases, left very important work undone out in their townships. In order to carry on that work you must study, counsel with people who know schools, and get a vision of the value of a child. Many of the one and two room schools are in pitiable condition and their libraries have been woefully neglected. Small inexpensive aids for the teachers may be withheld in some cases because the trustee does not see the value of them and he may be unwilling to listen to someone who knows. May God save the boys and girls from officials who do not know and who are unwilling to listen to someone who does know schools. I am not saying that we have any such men on either of these boards who have gone to that extreme but it is a tendency devoutly to be shunned by all trustees.

The people expect you to spend money on their schools. The best loved trustee is the one who spends when he gets a dollar's worth for a dollar. People appreciate good schools even if they do growl about paying for them. I know a trustee in another county who decided he would save the people a great deal of money. He cut down on the schools and did save money. When

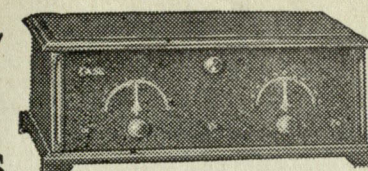

Another feature of our Christmas institute program is the Zionsville combined Glee Clubs singing Christmas carols under the direction of Mrs. Olive Casey, supervisor of music in Zionsville schools. A unique feature of this performance is the boy accompanist, who is truly an artist.

time to nominate a trustee came around again he picked a man to succeed him, but this man had to put a placard on his automobile saying that he was not in this trustee's camp or he would have been overwhelmingly defeated. It is not necessary to be extravagant, but it is necessary to ask "What do the schools need?" and have some regard for people who know what they need when you seek an answer.

The schools should compare favorably with the homes of the community. The fact that the little rural school is battered badly by the bad boy doesn't excuse the trustee from repairing them as fast as they are damaged. If the township does not build a school house which will have at least a tendency to hold the boys' respect they should repair the old ones as fast as they are damaged because all must suffer for the fault of the few if the repair work is not done. It is claimed that the one and two room school is so much cheaper than the consolidated. Make them come up to the standard and keep them there with all the equipment and supplies and let people wake up to the fact that they are the most expensive school in existence. The reason they have been cheap is because they have had little spent on them. Do not forget that you get what you pay for—no more.

Finally, we need more supervision. It can be done at a small per capita cost and the result will be a hundred fold. This supervision is only needed in the unconsolidated townships as the principals in the consolidated schools can take care of this problem there.

Do not misunderstand me. I have the greatest confidence in this incoming Board. You are above the average, no doubt, and you can do things. The people of Boone

County are watching you; their hopes and prayers are with you. The boys and girls of Boone County are, as it were, depending upon you in a very large measure for their future.

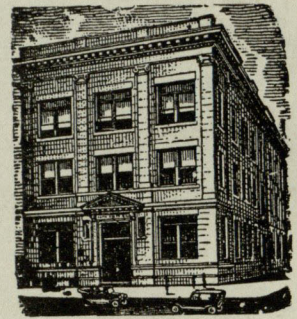
