President Reagan focused his brief remarks on his latest program - The Freedome to control our Economic Bill of Rights, citing freedom to work, freedom to enjoy the fruits of our labors, and freedom to participate in a free market. The President asked. "Help me start a national discussion of Economic Bill of Rights among the people." He said he campaigned for tax reform in 1985, and now it's the law of the land.

In closing, the President said his Economic Bill of Rights had the same aim as the original Bill of Rights -Freedom.

Before leaving Commissioner Raymond Andrews Jr. presented a picture of the courthouse and ther county buildings to the President. The artist, K.P. ingh, was acknowledged by the President who said "This will be hanging in the Reagan Library.'

About the time the President left the airport for Danville, 17 County officials and others who were scheduled to meet with Mr. Reagan in closed session before his rotunda appearance, left the main floor for the third floor meeting room.

EDITOR'S NOTE: The following remarks were delivered by Hendricks Circuit Court Judge Jeffrey V. Boles on the courthouse square in Danville to commemorate the July 4 Holiday and the 200th year of our Constitution.

* * * On this day, 200 years ago, the summer heat raged in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. The Constitutional Convention had adjourned for July 3rd and 4th, so that the Delegates could go and try to find a cool place to relax. From May to September there were only five days of cool weather. In the searing heat of a Philadelphia summer. the great experiment of power in the people was born. Fourth of July Celebrations were in their infancy. Philadelphia sweated and celebrated.

200 Years Ago The infant states of the Confederacy found themselves facing a crisis of confusion on the brink of failure. Farmers in Massachusetts had been in open rebellion because the State had not paid its war debts and money speculators were getting rich. A depression gripped the Country. Debtors

The Fifty-Five Fathers began gathering inside the Pennsylvania State House with its windows tightly sealed. They would meet from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday thru Saturday, from May 14th, 1787 to September 17, 1787. All wore buckles of silver below the knee and stockings of imported silk. The doors were guarded, workman shoveled loose dirt in the street to quiet the clatter of hooves and carriages. The meetings operated under a strict rule of secrecy imposed by George Washington, because as he said "Gossip and misunderstanding can easily ruin all the work we have to do." Not even family members could know what was going on.

Robert Morris nozilinated George Washington to preside over the Convention George Washing the Mail the Convention from a chair with a ge dan rising sun in its

back. The Father of our Country would speak only once during the four sweltering months of the Convention. He did frown or smile as the speakers pleased or upset him. He had a hard time making himself heard, because of his ill fitting wooden false teeth. An old and feeble Benjamin Franklin

arrived in a sedan carried by four convicts. He would not speak at all during the Convention. He spoke through an assistant. When a dispute between the Delegates broke out, Franklin brought the Delegates a bottle with a two-headed snake preserved in it and asked "What would happen if one head decided to go one way and the other another?" The Delegates settled their

dispute. James Madison, the Father of our Constitution, by special permission, was seated at the front of the hall and took notes. It is from these notes that we have the most accurate view of the Convention
