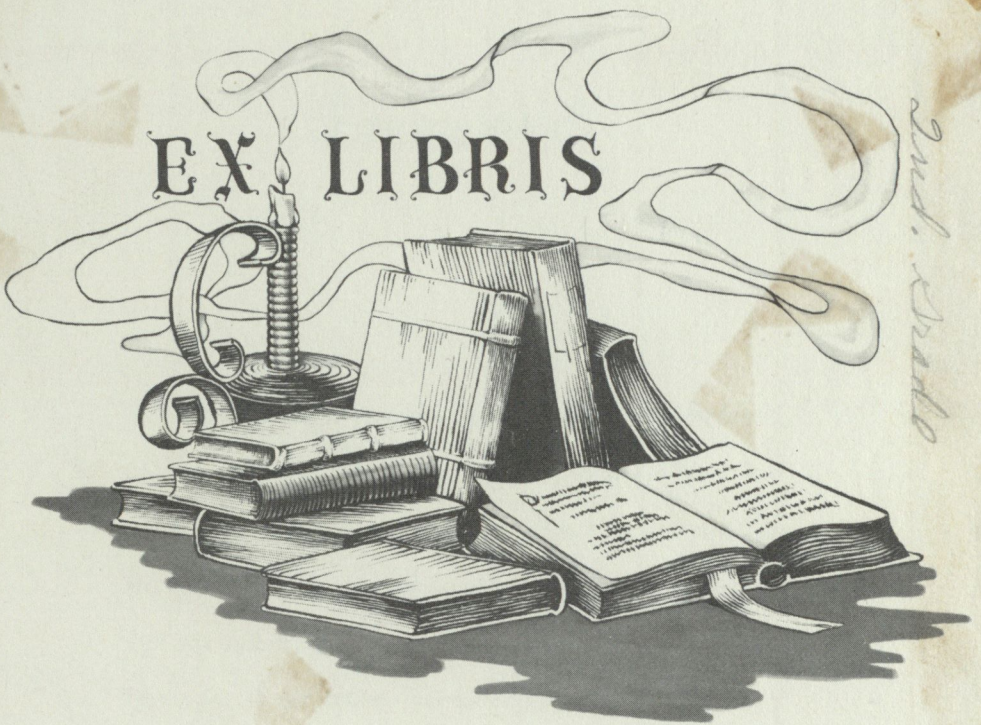

Thru the Halls

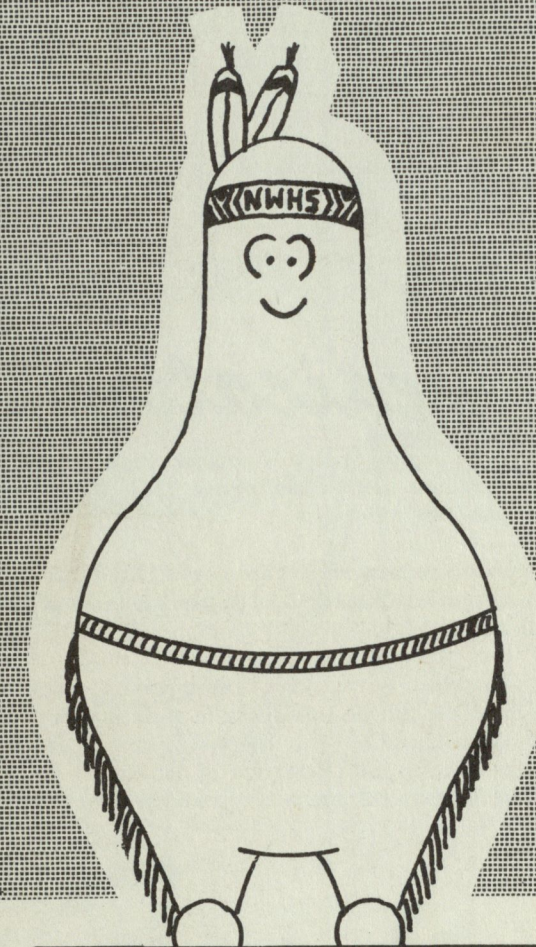

Our yearbook is one of the most important achievements in our school life and we would like to share it with you.

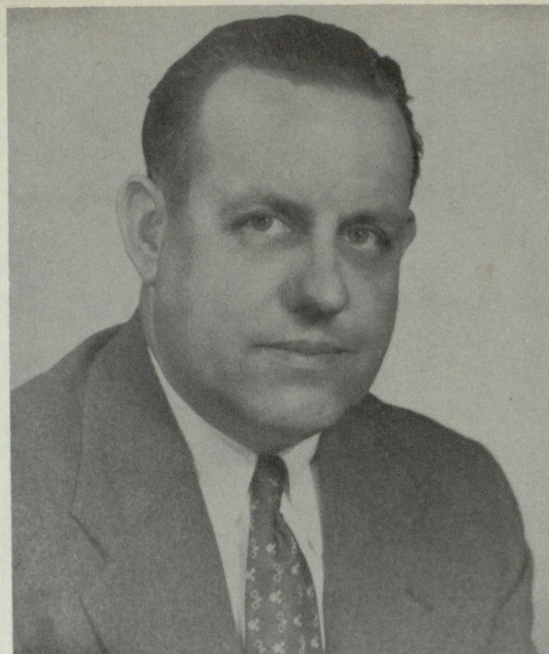

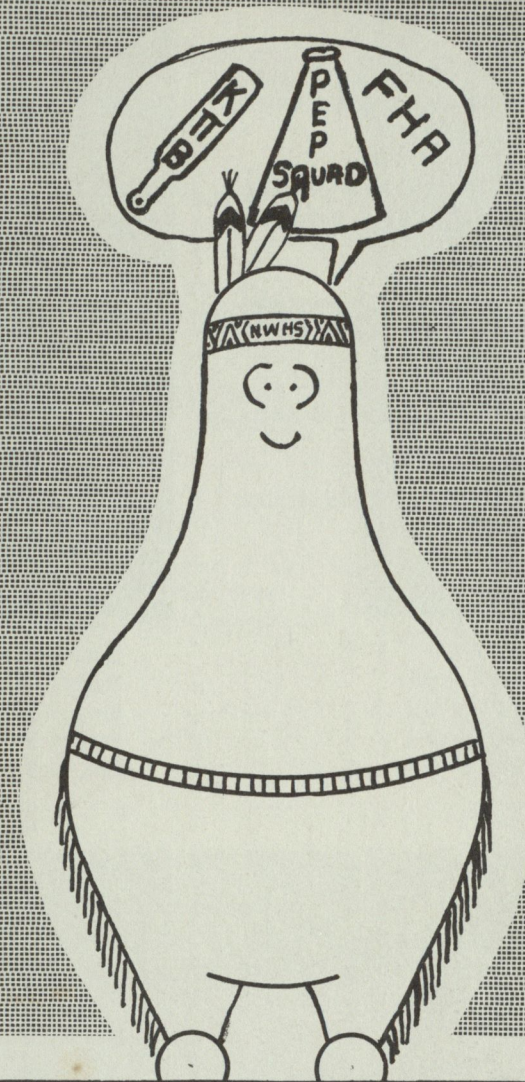
